Project:

This 10,000-square foot community center located at Cyrus Greene Park provides several amenities to the East Tampa community, including a multipurpose room, computer lab, dance room, game room and kitchen. The center offers programs and activities for adults and children, including an after school program. The project was funded through a \$17 million bond issued in 1990 to improve the city's recreational facilities.

Artist's Concept:

Belmont Heights Diamond is a multivalent work that celebrates both the history and the culture of an African American community. It is a neighborhood that has strong ties to baseball history; from the Negro Baseball League to the present-day Belmont



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
