TPD District III Offices in East Tampa Under Construction

A groundbreaking took place on June 21, 2006 for the new Tampa Police Department District III facility that encompasses the majority of the East Tampa CRA. Approximately \$9.2 million has been committed to the construction of the district headquarters located at the corner of North 22nd Street and East 31st Avenue, including \$1.5 million of Tax Increment Funds

approved by the East Tampa Community Revitalization Partnership. Unique features of the site plan include a "walk-through-time" memorial honoring the accomplishments of the Belmont Heights Little League and the contributions of Tampa's African-American police officers. Completion of the project is anticipated to be Summer 2007.



Fair Oaks Pond. located on 34th Street and East Ellicott Street, serves as one of the three stormwater ponds designated as part of two pilot projects for the retention pond beautification effort. Due to its location adiacent to the Fair Oaks Park and Community Center,

this pond was chosen to be completed first. Planned improvements at this location include a walking trail, landscaping, lighting, a picnic area and a gazebo. This will also provide for a more pedestrian-friendly area. The City of Tampa has allocated \$50,000 for the

Program Helps Provide Home Repairs

The City of Tampa allocated approximately \$295,000 of Tax Increment Funds for fiscal year 2006 to the Housing Rehabilitation Program. The program offers assistance to homeowners in need of rehabilitation or code violation repairs and homeowners may qualify for as much as \$50,000.

Since 2005, 16 homes have been completed through this program and 12 have been evaluated to begin work.

The goal for 2007 is to provide a minimum of 25 families in the East Tampa area with rehabilitation.

Through this program, East Tampa will continue to provide a safe and wholesome environment for all.
