

**Business Impact Estimate**  
**Section 166.041(4), Florida Statutes**

This Business Impact Statement concerns a proposed ordinance of the City of Tampa, Florida, the title of which is as follows:

An Ordinance of the City of Tampa, Florida, making revisions to City of Tampa Code of Ordinances, Chapter 22 (Streets and Sidewalks). Article I (Administrative Provisions); amending sections 22-116 through 22-121 and sections 22-123 through 22-128 and sections 22-132 through 22-133; providing for repeal of all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith; providing for severability; providing an effective date.

The Bench Ordinance update brings the code into compliance with current Americans with Disabilities Act and related Public Right-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines requirements and streamlines the advertising bench application process and administration. The changes in the ordinance provide an opportunity for vendors to secure longer term advertising contracts resulting in a stronger return on the investment of the infrastructure.

City costs will be reduced as the permit cycle will change through attrition from annual permits for all benches to three-year cycles for metal or equivalent benches.
